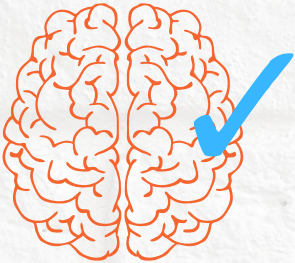
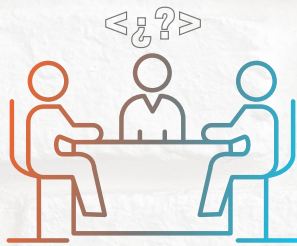


Child Interpreters and Translators
